Synopsis

The focus this year is that perennial quandary:

**"The good news is we won the project...
The bad news is we won the project ... "**

Following the general pattern of project Bid, Mobilization and Delivery life cycle stages, the workshop explores causes and cures for the gaps and trouble spots so often encountered along the way. Many of these would seem to be foreseeable and preventable, and Engineering Procurement Contracting Companies and Owner Operators try to work hand in glove to ensure smooth progress through the project lifecycle.

Despite this effort, it seems that at the start of a proposed project when the bid is being formulated, IT is often forgotten. Inevitably, the stage arrives when the project is won and IT learns that:

- It's a lump sum project
- It's a JV with another contractor
- Engineering is in 3 locations
- Everybody involved in project ten years ago has retired
- The client demands constant collaboration
- IT must incorporate the client's knowledge management strategy
- The project involves new regulations, or
- The asset must operate for the next 25 years at minimum cost

And all this has to be balanced against cost and must be measured against a work programme which is already underway.

The Expert Advisory Panel and invited guests will discuss causes and explore ways to forestall these difficult 'gaps' at the start of the project lifecycle. Concrete results are sought in interactive sessions. To ensure actionable, tangible outcomes, conclusions are written up and later distributed to Workshop attendees.

Facilitated Plenary and Break Out sessions promote lively and open debate – and to encourage openness and the sharing of information, the world-famous Chatham House Rule* is applied with rigor. With this understanding, participants can exchange ideas fully and frankly with their peers.
